Year 11 agriculture students completed their mandatory Farm Case Study as part of their study of the subject Agriculture on Monday 1st of April, 2019. They visited Camden Park Environmental Education Centre. At the Centre Mr. Brian Trench Principal and Farm Manager took the students on a farm tour and explained the commercial importance of the farm. He gave detailed information about the History, topography, soil, climate, irrigation, pasture types, types of fertilizers, meat production, meat standards of Australia and the production of silage used at the farm. The students participated with great interest in practical activities and asked questions about the production and marketing of beef.











Sydney Tower Excursion

Last term 26 Hospitality students went on an excursion to Sydney Tower. The tour began underground with the production kitchen and an informative talk by the Executive Chef. The Tower's HACCP plan was explained, along with temperature records for the storage of food in cool rooms and freezers. It was a 45 minute tour which provided industry examples to assist students' with their HSC Examination responses.


We then took the lift to the top of the tower to enjoy the panoramic views and explore both the all a carte and buffet restaurants. The tour guide covered the technological aspects of the course by explaining the on line booking system and how they monitor staff attendance through bio metric finger printing. Students enjoyed a gourmet buffet lunch at the completion of the tour in the revolving restaurant.

By attending this excursion, Students had the opportunity to learn about current food hygiene practices and work, health and safety which is an integral part of the Hospitality Preliminary course.

















On the first day of camp, the 26th March, we had to be at school before 7:45am so we can get an early start. We had to cross a wooden bridge over a river to the bus. We then had to swap buses, and half of the group took a bus half way whilst the other half walked half way, the bus then picked them up. The bags arrived and we were placed into 4 groups for the 4 activities with a side activity, we then got ready for the activities. Our cabins were small but still had enough space for bunk beds. Everyone then went to their first activity, then we each group would rotate and do a different activity.

There were 5 activities including canoeing, mud park, aqua park, flying fox and archery. Canoeing was fun because you got to go in a canoe and paddle across a big river with a partner. The guides and teachers were there to help us if needed it. It was exciting and fun because for some of us it was our first time canoeing.

The Aqua Park was fantastic, it was a giant inflatable slide with an inflatable raft next to it. You had to get on to the raft which was quite difficult, then you had to move across the raft to get on the slide, which you had to climb. While some people played with the sand, others played in the water and some people played games like Betrayal on House Hill which was the slide. This was so much fun to do. Some teachers went on to which made it more fun to see them fall.

Archery was so exciting and for some a new activity to try out. Some people hit the centre of the target, some people weren't as skilled as others but still had a great time having a go and learning. The Flying fox was also a fun amazing activity. Most students enjoyed the ride, despite the harnesses only being comfortable for some people. The Mud Park was amazing, there were many obstacles such as the rope swing, the pipe and slide climb. First we had to crawl through the tires and climb up a muddy mountain, after we had to slide down the slide into a huge mud pool. We then had to do the rope swing and land on to the tire, next we had to slowly manoeuvre across the pipe. Later we had to hold the rope and walk across the thin piece of wood.









We then had to crawl under the rope grid, which was difficult for some people. We then had to climb up another mud mountain and slide down again. This time the mud pool was deeper than the one before and finally you had to cross another pipe, while getting sprayed by a hose. It was fun but we smelled bad because of the mud.

In the evening we had night activities such as mini hockey and sitting by the camp fire, singing. We were given marshmallows on skewers and roasted them over the open fire. The hockey game was fun since you had to compete another team when they called out your number. At camp the food was good, like the chicken schnitzel and hamburgers. The best was the potatoes over the camp fire. We also had dessert after dinner which was delicious too.

On the way back to school everyone was exhausted and some kids were sleeping, so there wasn't loud music playing. When we arrived back to school we picked up our bags and luggage before going home for to see our families and rest.

A huge thank you to our year advisors Mr Ostojic for organising most of the camp and to Mrs Magiropoulos for assisting him in many ways. Without our year advisors doing this there would be no camp for us to get to know more about our peers and have some fun team bonding. Connecting students with University

On the 2nd of April 2019, 19 students had the opportunity to participate in a group session of the Western Sydney University Fast Forward Program. This program was designed for us to learn of the many options that university gives us and the value that further study holds.

This particular session was all about us learning how to navigate through the University website. With the use of laptops, we started off by searching for particular subjects or courses that we may be interested in and what Western Sydney University in particular had to offer. We gained knowledge of what is required for us to get into a specific course or other pathways.

We were then showed of how particular courses will help us with our career paths and what we are hoping to achieve in the future. We used a website called Qilt so that we were able to search for the opinions that previous students had regarding the course that they had taken and to see whether that particular course was the right for us. We learnt of how WSU offers a college where students who have not been accepted into university could possibly do their study through another way and still end with the same results. There was a light shone on the HSC True Reward and Bonus Points early offer program so that as students, we can advance into university based on our bands for specific subjects as oppose to our end HSC result, giving us an advantage for our education.

Lastly, after having all our questions answered we were given the opportunity to register for multiple events that were occurring at WSU so that we could gain more information on our studies and have knowledge on how to get to where we want to be.

This session of the program offered a great insight into the access to university and the many pathways that can be taken for us to get into our further study. This program is and will continue to be of great use to us so that we can go on to achieve the goals that we have set for ourselves.
